RE: 12-H 7555 Substitute A

Dear Gov. Chafee:

I'm writing to urge that you sign into law 12-H 7555 Substitute A – "An Act Relating to Public Records – Access to Public Records."

While the bill as amended and finally passed does not contain all of the reforms sought by our allies and our state and regional affiliates, there is no doubt that these needed changes will bring about greater accountability and more transparency for the citizens of Rhode Island.

The important principle that the written and recorded instruments of government belong to the people, not to the government itself, is one at the heart of democratic self-government. The important reforms in this bill will help to ensure that the principle of open, transparent government is more than a platitude in the state of Rhode Island.

The balancing test regarding public versus private information in personnel records mirrors that in the federal Freedom of Information Act, as well as language established by statute and case law in many other states. Similar balancing schemes have been in place for many years in Arkansas, Wisconsin, Connecticut and New Hampshire without giving rise to a spate of lawsuits or superfluous bureaucratic confusion.

The National Freedom of Information Coalition (NFOIC) is a nonpartisan network of state open government groups and advocates dedicated to protecting the public's right to know and citizens' rights of access to the records and meetings of governmental entities at all levels.

Our member organizations, the New England First Amendment Coalition (NEFAC) and ACCESS-RI, and other good-government and open-government advocates in your state, worked collaboratively with legislators to craft a bill that guarantees the public's right to know what their government does to and for

them, without creating inefficiencies or sacrificing Rhode Islanders' concerns about privacy.

On behalf of our board of directors, I urge you to sign the bill into law. Thank you for your consideration. If I can provide more information or clarification, please do not hesitate to contact me.
